The PFA believes a better informed game leads to more impactful football education, analysis and decision-making.





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# **Goal-scoring & Competitiveness**



When the preliminary rounds are included, the FFA Cup is a far less balanced and much higher scoring competition than the A-League. This reflects the assumption that amateur teams are more tactically open than professional teams, while unbalanced matches between teams from different tiers could also contribute. The 'tournament proper' from the Round of 32 through to the final is much tighter, though still more open than the A-League, partly due to mismatches between professional and semi-professional teams.

The possibility of extra time also allows for more goals per game.


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## **Effect of Travel**

#### Away Team Win %



Despite lacking the fully professional logistical support of A-League teams, Member Federation clubs traveling interstate in the FFA Cup actually outperform A-League away teams. Perhaps the novelty and camaraderie of traveling away together has elevated the performance of these teams for one-off matches.

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# Effect of 'Cup Runs' on A-League

#### 2014-15




The unique timing of the FFA Cup presents a challenge to A-League clubs, who enter the Round of 32 during pre-season, yet the evidence shows that an FFA Cup run correlates with a good start to the season. All but two of the nine teams to play in the FFA Cup semi-finals have been placed in the top half of the A-League after one third of that season, and five of the six finalists have been placed in the top three.



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Member Federation clubs are more than twice as likely to field teenagers in the FFA Cup than A-League teams do during the regular season.

A-League clubs do use more youth in the FFA Cup than in the regular season, however this figure dropped sharply from over 10% of appearances by teenagers to 6.1% in the latest edition.

#### **A-League comparison**

When compared with the PFA's 2015-16 A-League Stadium Ratings findings, the results showed the smaller FFA Cup grounds made for a slightly better atmosphere but suffered a large drop in pitch quality.

#### **Timing of Final**

When asked the question: "Do you believe the FFA Cup should finish prior to the start of the A-League season?" just over half of players said the final should remain during the A-League, as is the current format.



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
